

What do we mean by 'a view'?





A view is something that we look at, usually for enjoyment.

It often involves the landscape, and guides your focus to something or somewhere in particular.

Windows are often put in to 'frame' views, or gardens planned around window views and sight lines.

Frames and Faces




Portraits of people often have frames around them. Can you find three different portraits in Forty Hall?
